"See, I am making all things new."

Revelation 21:5 NRSV

"Making all things new." Take note of the verb-tense. Making. In the Greek, that active voice of the verb is emphasized even more than our English language can portray. God is "ongoing-ly" making all things new. It's not translated, "I made all things new," but rather, "...I am making all things new." The trajectory is clear—God is still working. God is still creating, still redeeming, and still blessing our world.



For our God, it is not just a one-time event at the

beginning of time or at the beginning of our individual lives; it is on-going.

As a group, humans tend to shy away from change, and yet---think of the promise in those words: God is continually making all things new! That is pure grace. That means all of the mistakes I make, all of the times I miss the target in living as He would have me live—ALL the time, God is working on me, making me new.

In Minnesota, we have the privilege of truly seeing that aspect of God's nature right before our very eyes as we transition from winter to spring and summer. Sometimes (most especially this year) when the snow seems to pile high and when the snowstorms keep coming and adding to that high pile---it seems as if there is no possible way that we will ever see Spring. It seems that the growth of new plants, the vibrancy of green grass, the hope of budding trees, and the sweet singing songs of birds are forever banished. And yet...and yet! Our God never fails. Sure enough winter wanes and new life springs forth. In fact, we witness all of creation being made new this time of year.

Translate that to your life. WOW! How remarkable. Take it one step further and translate that to our collective life together as the Body of Christ. Incredible!

God is making all things new. You. Me. Us.

Zion is experiencing that new life in so many tangible ways---the stories would fill too many pages for a newsletter! Did you know that our confirmation students (that is 6, 7, and 8th graders) have invited more than 20 of their friends to join them in our confirmation program? As in, not only come to see what it is like--but these 20+ kids are joining in, they are committing, they are "all in". That is God making all things new through the lives and invitation of our Zion kids.



I am happy to officially announce the Council has selected the members of the Call Committee for the Associate Pastor. I want to personally thank and recognize the congregants who have volunteered to be part of this important next step for Zion. The members are a good mix of individuals, with varied backgrounds, and are eager to initiate the call. Zion's constitution outlines the parameters for our Call Committees. We will have seven voting members and two alternates serving on the Call



Committee. Voting members will attend each meeting of the Call Committee. Those who are listed as "alternates" serve an important role and will have the opportunity to attend every meeting but will not have a vote [*unless a voting member leaves the committee, then the alternates will be given a votel. The group decided at the first meeting in May for the alternates to have a voice at the meetings, which is great to allow everyone to have their thoughts heard. Voting members include, Paula Herda (Co Chair), Brandon Prell (Co Chair), Taryn Bullert (Communicator), Heidi Gallert (Devotions Leader), Eric Mattson (Past Chair), Dusty Finke and Chad & Laura Peterson (sharing one vote). Alternates are Diane Paulu, and Jennifer Forsberg. Please join me in welcoming them to the committee and thanking them for their commitment of time, energy and perspective as they search for an Associate Pastor who will share in our mission at Zion. The group held their initial meeting on May 10th with Associate Bishop Pastor John Hulden, who provided an overview of the process, rules of confidentiality and answered questions from the committee members.

There are many steps in the process and I will highlight some of the upcoming near-term actions. The committee will update the Ministry Site Profile, a.k.a. Zion's resume, with key information about our church, community and ministries. Once final, this document will be provided to the Synod, who will help identify candidates seeking a call or pastors that would be a good fit for Zion. If you have any candidates to recommend, please send those names and their current church to Taryn at callcommittee@zionbuffalo.org for consideration, with assistance from Synod. Upon receiving a list and reviewing interested candidates, interviews will be scheduled and the selection process will begin.

I am sure you are thinking about how long the call process might take and while there isn't a firm schedule, trust the committee is working diligently to complete their work. They will provide periodic updates to keep us all apprised of their progress. Please join me in thanking and keeping each of the Call Committee members in your prayers as they continue in this endeavor.

Financial Report

The Finance Committee would like to share the following information about Zion's finances as of the end of April 2023. Our General Fund income/offering for the month of April was about \$81,000 which is almost 3% lower than what was received in April of 2022. For the first four months of this year our average weekly income/offering is \$15,214 which is up about 1% over this time last year. Expenses for the General Fund for the year to date are up a little over 3% from those incurred in 2022.



As we look forward to the coming months, the biggest financial challenge we will be facing will be the addition of our second pastor. This will obviously enhance our ability to do ministry and add even more excitement to Zion's family, but we must remain aware of the financial responsibility that will occur when this happens.

The Building Fund income for the month of April is about 2.5% more than was received in April of last year. For the year to date, Building Fund income is running 5.75% more than last year at this time. This amounts to about \$3100 more than our mortgage expense.

We want to extend a sincere thank you to all who continue to make Zion alive through their financial support. We are so blessed that there are so many of you who make this a priority.



Ukrainian Families Adjusting Well

Thanks to Zion members and the surrounding community for the tremendous support you have given to the Ukrainian families that have been displaced by the war. Over \$15,000 has been collected from individuals, Zion Foundation, St. Francis Xavier, Rotary, Thrivent, and the Easter Egg fundraiser.

Viktoria, the young woman who we had intended to sponsor, has elected to stay in Ukraine. Her boyfriend, who she thought had died in the war, was seen in a POW camp, and was recently released in a prisoner swap. We are thrilled for Viktoria and this turn of events.

Yevhen and Katya, the couple who visited Zion, are doing well. They and Katya's mother, Natella, live in Minnetonka where Yevhen has a job with Cargill. Katya and Natella continue to work on classes in English and certifications in their medical fields.

Dmytro and Alina Bushkin and their two children rent a house in Coon Rapids where Dmytro has also found employment. Dmytro's mother, Halyna, has completed cancer treatments but is waiting further tests to determine the next steps.

A third family—Alexander, Christina, and their daughter Varya, who is 6 months old, fled Ukraine and went to Germany. They recently arrived in the U.S. and are living with the Bushkins until they can find an apartment of their own. Alexander is a hairdresser and Christina was an international banker.

Although we are not the official sponsors for any of these displaced families, we have been offering support on an as-needed basis. Financial distributions have been approved by Zion's Ukrainian Family Support Group. We have reimbursed travel expenses for Dmytro's mother, occasionally assisted with utilities and rent, covered necessary out-of-pocket expenses, coordinated food assistance through the food shelf and local contributions, and are in the process of finding and delivering appliances and furniture that have been requested.

All of these families are grateful for the help they are receiving but are eager to become self-sufficient. Thank you again for your ongoing prayers and support.

A Zion staff member was recently visiting a family member in the nursing home when the nurse came into the room, singing a bit under her breath. "I have to tell you, you have a beautiful voice, do you sing professionally as well as working here?" Nurse responds: "No, I used to sing at church, but quit going after Covid and haven't gotten back into the habit." "Yeah, I think that is true for lots of people." I'm kind of thinking about joining that big church by the golf course. "You mean Zion?" Yes, that's it. I've heard good things are happening there. Do you know anything about it? "Well...as a matter of fact, I do! I work there." By the end of the conversation, another person is excited about walking through our doors to experience welcome, Jesus, and seeing many lives being made new through Christ! Maybe she will even be singing with our choir or one of our worship teams some day?

One Sunday morning, not too long ago---three little ones were being held by their parents at the baptismal font. We welcomed them in. We prayed for and made promises with them and their parents. Too often, I have baptized children and not seen their parents again until Sunday School or sometimes---ever. I get it. Life is busy. Especially with little ones. But guess what? All three of these families have been in worship since that day of baptism. I think that is because they experience something being made new at Zion. I also think it is because you are genuinely welcoming to children.

Now, just because something is being made new, doesn't mean the old was bad, wrong, or no longer valid. In fact, my experience has been that God never throws away the old. He transforms it. Who we were yesterday is of significant importance to God; after all, He knew each of us in our mother's womb. That goes for us as a collective as well. He knew Zion before we were Zion. He takes all that we are and all that we are going to be and makes us new and alive in each new day.

A grieving family is offered the option of having their loved one's service live streamed. "Oh, you would do that for us?" "Of course, anything we can do." Tears of grateful relief begin. "That means his dad can see the service. Thank you." A few years ago, Zion would not have even contemplated live streaming a funeral service and now it is another way of reaching out and sharing Jesus' hope and promises at a very difficult time in a parent's life. That is God making us new.

My guess is, it wouldn't take you long to think of the ways you have seen God at work in your life and in our collective life at Zion. God will continue to transform our community with the addition of an associate pastor, as well as with the addition of new members, new visitors, and renewed members coming home. What an amazing gift God's continual investment in us is.

It is a privilege to invest my own time, money, energy, and faith into this place with you. God is making us new, and God is sustaining our history and encouraging our future. Thank you for the ways you invest in this community too. Together, we partner with God and with each other to bring the new life of community, welcome, forgiveness, strength, laughter, love, and acceptance into everyday lives, in the name of the Risen Lord. That in and of itself is renewing, refreshing—that is co-creating with the Creator of all that is, seen and unseen! What a hope-filled, joyful mission we are on together. Thanks be to our continually renewing God who makes us see and experience His great love anew, every single day. May we always be faithful in helping others experience that newness in their lives as well. May we always be faithful in lifting up what is possible for all people, because of the new life we have in Jesus!

Her development of Zion's newsletter was often lifted up as the example of "how to do a newsletter well". Of course, her work went well beyond the newsletter. She fostered Zion into a new age of social media presence with website, Facebook, Twitter, and Instagram. She led the way in establishing communication guidelines and goals. All the while also serving as Zion's manager of the database and membership records. Now... before this gets to sounding too much like she is leaving her job at Zion, let us say: she is not leaving her work at Zion! She is, however, transitioning.

First: we owe her many, many, many thanks for the work she has so faithfully accomplished. - 3/ they are juggling their current workload to attend to the immediate needs we have in the interim, but they are first responsible for their ministries to which they were hired,
- 4/ therefore by necessity, they cannot and will not be expected to maintain everything as it has always been.
